## Have You Ever Been Assaulted on Duty?

several months ago, Canadian legislation passed a bill that made it a criminal offence to assault a firefighter on duty. Since then, PPAO President Darryl Wilton has been working hard to convince the government to draft a sister bill for paramedics.

Darryl's first step was to submit a request

to the federal government to draft a private member's bill to make it an indictable criminal offence for a paramedic to be assaulted while on duty. He also invited the Ontario Paramedic Association and the Paramedic Association of Canada to initiate a nation-wide lobby initiative and wrote a petitioning letter that medics across Canada could sign and submit to their respective MPs in support of the new legislation.

Many paramedics responded and contacted their MPs. President Wilton has followed up with a number of MPs in the Ottawa region and across Ontario, including MP Mario Silva, who was responsible for drafting the first piece of legislation on behalf of firefighters across Canada.

All this lobbying and letter writing has resulted in great news. MP Mario Silva's office has confirmed that he has introduced a private member's bill into parliament that has been designated Bill C-495. If made into law, this bill will make it an Indictable Criminal Offence to assault a paramedic who is on duty.

As defined by Canadian Law, an Indictable Criminal Offence in Canada is an offence which is more serious than those which can proceed by summary conviction. It is the Canadian equivalent to the USA felony. Murder and treason are examples of crimes committed in Canada which would be indictable offenses. These crimes are usually tried by federally-appointed judges and carry heavy sentences.

You should all be very proud this national initiative was started right here in Ottawa.

### **National Paramedic Week 2008**

A s you know, National Paramedic Week always takes place during the third week of May. This year, falling back on our duty to endorse injury prevention strategies, the PPAO will be promoting the message "Accident is not a word".

Between now and National Paramedic Week, Director of Media Relations Rob Wilson will focus PPAO efforts on politely correcting the media when the wrong language is used and will provide the media with suitable alternatives. Rob will educate the media about why the term "accident" is inappropriate and should be replaced with words like "crash", "collision" or "incident". The PPAO is also able to back our suggestions with bilingual versions of the official Thesaurus of Injury Prevention Terminology which was obtained by President Darryl Wilton from SmartRisk Canada.

Chris Bugelli, a new addition to PPAO Interim Directorship, has been tasked with creating an information campaign that will lead up to National Paramedic Week. The PPAO will be providing the media and public with reminders about some of the most dangerous components of our job—motorists who do not know how to properly yield to emergency vehicles during all three phases of a call (response, scene treatment and transport).

### 1. Response

We are going to show the media examples of how poor driving limits our ability to arrive at life-threatening emergencies quickly. If paramedics have to negotiate multiple poor drivers on the way to a call, each occurrence might only be worth additional seconds, but it is the combination of all of these occurrences that adds minutes to each scene re-

sponse. It is the cumulative impact of these occurrences that can make the difference between life and death in an emergency and stop paramedics from reaching the City of Ottawa's response time objective of 8 minutes and 59 seconds on Code 04 life threatening emergencies.

### 2. Scene Treatment

While paramedics are on scene at the side of a highway, paramedics are at their most vulnerable. We want the public to follow Ontario's "Move Over" law by slowing down and leaving a completely empty lane between emergency workers and themselves. We are also going to remind motorists not to park near ambulances—especially near the back doors.

### 3. Transport

The third aspect of our job is one that motorists rarely consider. When paramedics have a critical patient on board, we are often using intravenous medications, handling needles and providing very invasive life-saving skills which can only be administered properly while we are unbelted and standing. If inattentive motorists cause the paramedic operating the ambulance to perform any sudden manoeuvres, it is certain to cause severe injury to the paramedic providing patient care and have a detrimental impact on patient outcome.

After covering each of these three components of a call, we will offer tips and tricks along with video aids to motorists so they can feel confident and make appropriate decisions when paramedics are approaching with lights or sirens activated.
